Sunbury

Whytock and Reid

his distinguished firm, forced into voluntary liquidation, ceased trading at the end of July.

In 1807 Richard Whytock, who pioneered new techniques in the weaving of damasks and carpets, set up in business at 9/11 George Street. In 1876 his son joined forces with Robert and Hugh Reid, whose father had built up a cabinet-making and upholstery business in Ayr and Glasgow and who had already been in business in Edinburgh for some years.

In 1884 the Reids' old workshops at Bell's Mills were replaced by the tall brick cabinet works in Sunbury. In 1934 the showrooms moved to 7 Charlotte Square, where they remained until modern showrooms (now 'Sunbury Lodge') were built in Sunbury in 1974.

Sunbury Lodge

few years ago all of Whytock & Reid's property was acquired by Manus Gregor, who lived in Sunbury Lodge for a while. But it is now empty, and Mr Gregor wants to build flats on its site. What is he planning now for the tall brick building and its lower wing?

A revised scheme for this land at the end of Sunbury Street has been submitted. The application is for two residential blocks, four storeys high, to form 12 flats with associated parking and landscaping. Bell's Mills

he Bell's Mills public enquiry has taken place and the Reporter has the full right to either agree with or overturn the Council's decision to reject planning consent for 24 flats in three blocks to be built at Bell's Mills on the banks of the Water of Leith. His decision is final. Bell's Mills Action Group put together a good body of evidence to support the case against the development and has been assisted by Shepherd & Wedderburn who acted for the Group in presenting the case to the Reporter. A decision should be made by the new year.

Congestion charging

The public inquiry into congestion charging has now been published and the inquiry has found that in the main, the proposal put forward by the Council is sound and that the congestion charging scheme should proceed.

It will be up to Edinburgh residents to decide in a referendum on the issue early in 2005. Don't lose your vote in the referendum. Have you returned your canvas form for the electoral register? If you haven't, you can still register - call 0131 469 5986 to be sent a form. If you have registered but opted out of the Edited Register (to avoid being put on mailing lists, etc) you will only be able to vote in next years transport referendum by filling out a referendum form available online at www.edinburgh.gov.uk or by calling 0131 529 4877.

Information about the proposed congestion charging scheme is available from Transport Edinburgh, I Cockburn Street or online, as above. A group of Edinburgh residents concerned about the way in which the Council is spending £600,000 to promote congestion charging has led to the setting up of a website on Edinburgh's current transport proposals. Go to www.transportedinburgh.info for information derived from background papers lodged as part of the Public Inquiry into congestion charging and from papers lodged with the Scottish Parliament for Tram Line One.

Boundary changes

ew legislation has been introduced to bring about changes in Scottish Constituencies. Edinburgh Central constituency will disappear and Dean ward will now go to Edinburgh North and Leith. These changes come into force at the next general election.

Community Councils

A consultation is being carried out which is proposing the establishment of 15 Local Community Planning Partnerships (LCPPs) across the city with the prospect of the scheme being implemented in 2005/6.

The City of Edinburgh Council is carrying out a review of the scheme for Community Councils and the final version of the revised scheme will be submitted to the Full Council on 7th April 2005. This review will be influenced by the concurrent review on local governance and community planning. It is stated in para 2.3 that the review of community councils is "intended to result in the re-alignment of community council boundaries with the new local partnership framework."

The latter would result in the abolition of the West End Community Council. which covers Dean and Dean would move to CPP North Area 3.

Crime Prevention Advice

with the evenings becoming shorter, homes can look very vulnerable in the early evenings and a lack of movement, activity and light within our homes can often be an invite to the opportunist thief. Take some very simple steps to give your home that 'lived in look.'

- Plan your day, work out what time you will return and prepare ahead.
- Ensure blinds, if fitted, prevent open view into rooms. Blinds keep them guessing.
- Set timers (can be bought cheaply) to turn on lights in various areas of the house before the light starts to fade.
- Timers can be used for radios as well, noise is a turn off for the thief.
- Glass front doors don't allow mail to be seen behind the door, create a box or receptacle to hold once delivered.
- Provide delivery (milk etc) with secure receptacle; don't leave on display.
- Set alarms, provide the police with key holder details.

Do you live in a flat?

he Tenement Bill passed in the Scottish Parliament will make sure that all flat dwellers, whether in traditional tenements or new apartments, will be responsible for the maintenance of the communal areas of their properties. It will create a more practical system for repair work. It will also mean that neighbour disputes can be resolved quickly and fairly. Door entry systems can now be installed by a majority of owners in a stair - rather than requiring a unanimous vote.

The state of the roads

If you've driven down Bell's Brae or Dean Path lately, you'll be aware of the bad state of repair of these roads. The Head of Transport at the Council has acknowledged to a Dean resident that these roads are not in an ideal condition and has advised that under the Council's prioritisation system, neither of these roads is included in the list for construction or renewal work before the end of the next three financial years. Minor defects have been identified that could benefit from temporary or small-scale permanent repairs. These were added to the schedule of normal works in August and will be seen to as soon as resources allow. There has been no indication as to when this will happen.

When reporting a lighting fault, try to quote the number printed on the lighting column.

Well Court grant application

he new board of the Edinburgh World Heritage Trust has initiated a review of the Trust's repair grants scheme.

Potential projects where a scheme of work has not yet been formally agreed with the Trust, such as the Well court project, have been deferred for consideration until after 1st April 2005.



The last of a generation

ancy Mackay (nee Lee) has died at the age of 84, five years after her husband Burns. They are survived by their son Roy and grandson Duncan.

Although Nancy and Burns did not live in the Village, many of us knew them as members of our Association, and they were much involved in the activities at Dean Parish Church.

Nancy was the youngest of a large family. She was born in 43 Well Court, where there were only three rooms for ten people; but it was better than their old flat in Dean Path. Their mother seems to have been a remarkable woman (DVN 112).

Meg Lee lived on at No. 35 almost to the end of her life (DVN 123). Robert and David lived in Dean Path, and Jim and his wife Lily at 50 Well Court, until Jim's failing health forced them to move.

The Lees are part of the history of the Village. The 1871 census has David Lee (24), his wife Helen (21) and their son David (3) and baby Margaret. A rapid check of the 1861 census has revealed no Lees, but there are other familiar surnames: Boswell, Muirhead, Plain, Fraser, Douglas, Weir, Legget. (Nancy's friend Merle McIvor is the daughter of a Boswell and grand-daughter of a Lee.)

Can you find your ancestors in these records? The details for Edinburgh are on microfilm (1841 to 1904) in the Edinburgh Room of the Central Public Library.

Dr Graham Priestley

Graham Priestley, volunteers manager for the Water of Leith Conservation Trust, has died at the age of 66, after a short illness.

Retiring early from his post as lecturer in dermatology in the University of Edinburgh, he devoted himself to other interests, especially angling.

He was already High Bailiff of the Water of Leith when the Water of Leith Trust was founded in 1988. He was one of the first trustees.

He gave us a talk about the mills in 2000 and Salmon in the Water of Leith in 2003 and it was he who initiated the annual clean-ups of the whole river.
